Minutes Arnada Neighborhood Association Meeting January 12, 2023

November Minutes approved.

Treasurer Report: With our checking, savings, and CD the ANA ending balance for 2022 was \$9601.69. Sponsorship totals was \$1771.38. Our total income was \$6721.21. Our total expenses were \$9,275.34. We reduced the ad discount and have a new rate for ads to cover increasing printing costs. Businesses have renewed so far. We are also now accepting electronic payments. The Treasurer report was approved

Neighborhood Officer: Lee Gelsinger:-Our new neighborhood officer. He previously was the trainer for the new officers. Arnada 2022 Statistics: Pulled quarter 4 from last year and crime has gone up from the previous year. Mostly related to auto theft. Most vehicles found across the river. Surveillance Cameras do help. There were only 3 robberies-all commercial. Two of those were the same person and he was caught. Officers now have Narcan - nasal administration for opioid overdose. Also got brand new AEDs - previous ones were 12 years old. Designed for adults, children and infants. They have a lot of officers training right now.

City Report-William Cooley City of Vancouver:

Main Street Promise Project is moving forward. It has gone through three planning improvements and each time it hasn't gone forward due to funding or other challenges. This time it is going forward. They will have a monthly advisory group-those are open to the public. The area that will be improved is between 9 th and 15 th. Infrastructure

and sidewalks need improvement.

Work on the Waterfront Gateway-no public meetings yet. They will host a music festival in August-4 days long. Will probably have venues across the city. Will be multi-genre with musicians across the country.

Port Report: Julie Rawls Port Authority: Grain ships are moving in and out-going to Asia. Metal Shred ship is also exporting to be melted down and made into new products in Asia. About 4000 Subarus are at the Port this week. Every car coming through is sold. Their new EV car Solterra is also coming in. The Port lecture series will start Feb. 15 th at the Kiggins with the Bar Pilots. They will tell you about how they get ships through the deadly Columbia Bar. The second one is WCOIT-Washington Council on International Trade-What trade looks like here, COVID, and what businesses are involved in international trade here. Tours will start again-10 tours this year. They usually start in May. They fill up really quickly. They will be on the Port website and she will send us information on those.

Arnada Park Toddler Equipment: Roman Gutierrez City of Vancouver:

The proposal is to replace the track slider with a 2-5 age play equipment. It will fit where the track slider is currently. Had a survey on what play equipment the neighborhood wants and the color. People who answered the survey chose the dome climber. The City will install the piece. The November meeting there was a proposal for us to match up to \$2500 of what is fund raised and then the City will add \$5000 to the project as well. The allocated \$5000 is for the year and is committed. There is a discretionary fund that they get yearly so if we can't fund raise enough money we have time. There is a system-wide need to get the playground replaced. Arnada is on the list and possibly done in 2025 but it depends on priorities. There will be an online survey and open house when that happens. Question on if this play piece will remain? It will depend on the theme the neighborhood picks at that time. Question on if we fall short of \$10,000 what will happen? There is some equipment for \$8000 so that is the goal. Motion made to allocate \$2500 toward the toddler playground equipment this year for Arnada Park. Motion seconded. 11 approved. 0 opposed. Motion passes.

input on the intersection of Fourth Plain and F. Purpose of the project is about safety. It has many issues. Small businesses, families, residences, and community destinations. They received a federal grant to repave the street. City wants to also address the safety issues with that. The project will address safety for everyone who uses the corridor. Improve walking and biking conditions and repairing potholes. The project will not be rebuilding the street in any substantial way. Phase 1 F St to Fort Vancouver Way will be done this year. 83% of the people they surveyed wanted them to re-purpose a lane for bus, biking and walking. Also canvassed businesses-88% responded favorably to repurposing a lane.

Preferred alternative for Phase 1-One travel lane in each direction and mobility lane for buses on Fort Vancouver. F Street to Ft. Vancouver interchange-will have a 2-way cycle lane. Will also preserve a sidewalk.

Phase 2-Fort Vancouver Way to Andreson Rd. Alternative 1 has buffered bike lanes with high separation from cars with the exception of Falk to Andreson because of the Vine. Alternative 2 focuses more on buses with a buffered bike lane with low separation-not as protected.

Question about the sidewalk by the park and F street south side-Very small and scary. No potential designs have been discussed for this section. This is a repaying project only.

New Business: Do we want the ANA to be a party of record/concern for the proposed large warehouse in Fruit Valley? The Developer has leased other properties to Amazon=more traffic most likely and environmental impact. Fruit Valley, Shumway and Carter Park have already joined. They will keep us informed of the project and can meet with the Developer if we are a party of record/concern. We agreed to be a party of record/concern.

Interstate Bridge Replacement: One resident wants someone from ANA to be on a committee. We have not been asked to be a part of the community advisory group.

Fund Donation: We have donated about \$100 to the Principal Checkbook to schools that are attended by Arnada children. It lets Principals buy things that the kids need-like glasses, clothes, etc. Put as a motion of consideration to be voted at the next meeting. Sandi will talk to the resource coordinators on their needs.

Shredding event: There are mobile shredding trucks that can come to a parking lot and people in the neighborhood could get things shredded. Maybe we could publicize the places that offer these large shredding events if we don't purchase this? Also maybe partner with businesses to do this?
