NEIGHBORHOOD TRANSPORTATION SAFETY ALLIANCE NEWS

The Neighborhood Traffic Safety Alliance (NTSA) is a group of volunteers from Vancouver neighborhoods who advocate for traffic safety throughout the community. Vancouver residents are encouraged to participate in the NTSA to learn more about traffic safety in their neighborhoods and become more involved in making the City a safer place to live. Ken Williams is Arnada's representative to the NTSA.

The last regular monthly meeting of the NTSA occurred on March 21, 2023. (Ken Visser filled in for Ken Williams at this meeting.) Representatives from about 15 Vancouver neighborhoods participated. Here are the highlights:

- Ryan Miles, the City's Street Operations Program Manager, shared information regarding the Pavement Preservation Program along with the 2022 paving projects, this year's projects and the 2024 paving projects. also rolled out. 1700 videos in two weeks already. Haven't had any information about people being opposed to the cameras. Stats for the neighborhood from Feb. 2022 to Feb 2023: Offenses are down 50.9% from last year. Still have issues with petty theft but what is driving percentage up is that there were two DUI's. Theft is down 72%, vandalism down 12%, burglary down 75%, and motor vehicle theft is down 42%. Usually, the highest month is March and May for crime. Question about catalytic converter theft across city-a lot of change. Places that were taking the recyclables have stopped. Now they need to register themselves to recycle them. Question: Narcan-should citizens have it with them and does it fall under Good Samaritan Law? Yes, the Revised Code of Washington said Narcan is protected under Good Samaritan. Taking it nasally is the way to go. CPR is often related to opioid overdoses and once Narcan is administered it can block the receptors from the opioid.

City Report-Daisy Quinonez State of the City on March 27 at 7pm at Firstenburg. State of the City with Mayor annual address followed by a City Council community forum.

Office of neighborhood survey out about what the future of the neighborhood programs should look like. Want to learn about challenges and identify opportunities. Encourage people to get involved and come to their neighborhood meetings.

Port Report: Julie Rawls Port Authority Grain ship and loading a copper concentrate ship-mined in Wyoming and used for batteries. Another one is scheduled on the 12th . 27 wind blades are coming in tomorrow. Later this summer, some that are coming are 83 meters-longer than a football field. The Lecture series is going on at Kiggins. State of the Port report is free to the public on April 27th at the AC Marriott. They will probably have some tours of terminal one if people are interested. Will have 10 Port tours May through September. You need to register for those tours early because they fill up fast.

Arnada Park Toddler Equipment: Collecting donations for the toddler climber that will be in the park. So far, we have \$1578. Only need \$592 and we can purchase it.

Tree Steward: Kathleen She was a retired professor of organizational behavior and development. Also did organizational consulting for 35 years. Dealt with street trees in Philadelphia and on campus where she taught. Also served on an invasive species committee reporting to City Council. Vancouver Urban forestry is concerned with tree canopy. Arnada has 18% and they would like 40%. Most is south of McLaughlin. She will be training and then determne where we would like to have trees. She will also be attending the invasive species and exotic pests conference on April 30 th . She will not be the invasive plants police, but she will educate.

Litter Steward: Sandi Went to training. They go over what to do with garbage and safety issues. They give you a bright yellow vest and they give you a sharps container. If you want to pick up trash, you can. If you don't, you don't. Is there any place in Arnada that people are seeing litter? If so, let us know. If you are interested in picking up trash, the City does trainings monthly.

Green Bag Program: Sandi Had 36 people signed up. Last month every single person donated. The food goes to FISH Westside pantry. They have a new system where the neighborhood coordinators do a sort of the more fragile items.

Memorial Day Party: Have a history of doing one on Monday of Memorial Day. Want to know if anyone wants to organize it? If interested, let us know. Also want to do the Witness Tree dedication for Starr Morales at that event.

New Business: We still need a business liaison volunteer to talk to businesses about signing up for ads in the newsletter.

Debby wants to know if we have had any **updates on the IBR program?** They said they are going to start doing more meetings in the spring so we should invite them for another update.

Our neighborhood cleanup will be September 30 th . Some people didn't like that donations were required. Ken will bring that up with the group. Also a question about if our portion of the donated money was given to Arnada? Kathy will follow-up.

Become a Litter Steward

The City of Vancouver is recruiting volunteers to put an end to litter in our community. Attend our "Litter Stewards" training to receive equipment and support from the City to clean up litter *wherever and whenever* you see it. An Arnada resident who has taken the training reports it is a simple 30 minutes of safety information held at City Hall, and you walk away with safety equipment and your own "litter picker" to be used whenever you wish on Vancouver city streets or parks.

We are part of something big!

The first Food Project was in Ashland, Oregon in 2009. There are currently 45 Food Projects in 11 states! The program started in Clark County in 2017 with 20 donors in the Truman neighborhood. Now, Arnada is just one of 115 neighborhoods or organizations that collect food/toiletries every two months in Clark County for the Clark Neighbors Food Project. Items are distributed to one of seven food pantries or six different school resource centers around the county. We have two businesses and 28 residences donating from Arnada. Donations from Arnada are delivered to the FISH Westside Food Pantry in downtown Vancouver. The Clark Neighbors Food Project also accepts cash donations.
