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## Introduction

The purpose of a neighborhood action plan is to identify issues that are of concern to the residents of the neighborhood, and to devise strategies for addressing these concerns. In conjunction with broader policies and implementation measures contained within the City's comprehensive plan, the neighborhood action planning process is intended to protect and enhance the livability within specific neighborhoods, as well as to help fulfill the overall community vision and to create a more livable city. More specifically, neighborhood action plans are intended to:

- Educate both city government and neighborhood residents about each other's concerns and visions for the future.
- Promote collaboration between the city and the neighborhood in order to achieve mutual goals and a shared sense of responsibility.
- Create a "sense of place" within the community by identifying and developing the assets within each neighborhood.
- Initiate change, rather than simply reacting to it, by addressing specific issues and opportunities.
- Achieve sensible and coordinated project and program planning within each neighborhood and between all the city's neighborhoods.
- > Strengthen neighborhoods.

# Relationship to the Comprehensive Plan

In general, a comprehensive plan is intended to provide broad policy direction, which is implemented through more specific development regulations and capital expenditure programs. Comprehensive plans do not, however, typically address the more immediate needs and concerns of individual neighborhoods. This is the purpose of a sub-area or neighborhood plan.

The City's new comprehensive plan, entitled *Visions for the Vancouver Urban Area*, was adopted in December of 1994. The Plan specifically states that the City should: "create neighborhood plans by assisting neighborhood organizations in identifying issues, policies and implementation measures specific to their areas."

The purpose of the Harney Heights Neighborhood Action Plan is to integrate neighborhood needs into the City's budget process, Six-Year Street Improvement Program, Neighborhood Traffic Control Program, Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan, and other planning and funding programs. The general policy statements included in the Action Plan may also be used by the City Council to guide future decisions involving development proposals and plan amendments affecting the neighborhood.

# The Neighborhood Action Planning Process

The Harney Heights Neighborhood Association with assistance from the City of Vancouver Neighborhood Services has developed this plan. The actual preparation of this plan is being coordinated by the Neighborhood Action Planning Committee, whose members were appointed by the Neighborhood Association to represent the interests of the neighborhood as a whole.

A survey was taken and a draft version of this Action Plan has been sent to each household in Harney Heights for review and comment by all residents of the neighborhood. After considering and reconciling comments from the residents, the plan has been endorsed by the Neighborhood Association according to their specific by-laws. After neighborhood approval the Plan will be forwarded to City Council for consideration and acceptance by resolution.

It is intended that city agencies will utilize the action plans as input in developing more specific work programs and helping to establish citywide funding priorities. It is recognized that many of the recommendations contained in the action plans are conceptual only and may need to be analyzed in greater detail, both individually and in relationship to other recommendations. It should also be emphasized that funding sources may not exist for implementing all of the recommendations identified in the plan. All of the actions identified in the plan are intended to be initiated and implemented by residents of the neighborhood.




This Plan contains four components. The NEIGHBORHOOD PROFILE contains a general description of the current conditions within the neighborhood. The VISION STATEMENT describes the neighborhood's sense of identity and vision for its future. The NEIGHBORHOOD OBJECTIVES identifies issues that are of concern to the residents of the neighborhood. The NEIGHBORHOOD ACTION STEPS includes specific potential strategies for accomplishing the identified objectives. Each Action Step is prioritized and identifies the responsible parties for implementing those strategies.

# Neighborhood Profile

Harney Heights neighborhood lies in the center of Vancouver. It's boundaries extend from Grand Avenue at the westerly end to its most easterly edge at Devine Rd, and from its most northern edge beginning at Fourth Plain Blvd. the neighborhood extends to Mill Plain Blvd. on its southern edge.


Harney Heights is zoned residential with a mix of R-18, R1-5 and R-22, which accounts for the higher then usual density of households within its boundaries. The Neighborhood is comprised of approximately 3000 residences with over 5,500 residents. As of today, there is only one little lot of an open space left in the neighborhood and the neighborhood has access to only one park.



Harney Heights is characterized by tidy older homes (many of which were built to house Kaiser shipyard workers), apartment houses, condominiums, and community commercial areas. There is a feel of a comfortable "home town" within a big city. Commercial areas along Fourth Plain Blvd., Mill Plain Blvd. and 18th Street provide Harney Heights with excellent access to numerous businesses including restaurants, gas stations, grocery and convenience stores, and a financial institution.

Residents of the neighborhood have determined that enhancement of the single park existing in the neighborhood and the development of additional parks within its boundaries to be a priority. Other priorities include installation of safe bicycle and walking paths, and regulation of vehicular speed in our neighborhood.

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### Vision Statement

Harney Heights has retained the desirable old neighborhood characteristics and charm of the Kaiser ship building neighborhood from which it evolved. Harney Heights comprises landscaped homes, apartments, condos and businesses. The memory of the shipyards has lead to a sense of cohesiveness and pride though out the neighborhood. These high standards are the cornerstones to a thriving, productive community where a variety of people reside, attend school, work, carry out business and play.

The people of Harney Heights perceive safe streets and well-kept yards as a given. Code enforcement and community policing are in place and actively supported by all members of the neighborhood through an aggressive volunteer program. We embrace the concept of self and family enrichment by supporting and participating in the arts, music and continuing education through our schools and community groups.

We enjoy leisurely walks and bicycle rides though the attractive tree lined streets where traffic volume and speed are closely controlled. Businesses are "neighbor-oriented" making them a pleasure to patronize. This strengthens the neighborhood's character as a historic and livable neighborhood.

A strong neighborhood asset is our willingness to maintain and improve our neighborhood's many parks. Our parks and green spaces bring balance to otherwise crowded neighborhood. Here we can play with our children, relax and have a neighborhood picnic, or attend a concert. Our green spaces host educational opportunities offered by our schools and community groups. The sight and sound of the birds, fragrance of flowers and trees that inhabit the areas enrich our lives and bring contentment.

# **Objectives and Action Steps**

The following recommended action items identified as having a "high" priority are considered bv Neighborhood Association to be most important. "Medium" priority action steps are somewhat less important. priority action steps considered least important.

Priority has been assigned by the Neighborhood Association for each action step without regard for the time frame within which the recommendation can realistically be accomplished (short-range, long-range) and without concern for whether funding sources can be practically identified. Accordingly, it is possible that a "High" priority item may not be realized for many years. In contrast, some "Low" priority items could be potentially accomplished in a relatively short amount of time without significant capital expense.
