How to Kill the Tree of Hell

The "Tree of Heaven" is an invasive, toxic plant that grows very rapidly and can quickly take over property. It is difficult to get rid of and secretes a chemical into the soil that is <u>toxic</u> to surrounding plants. It can grow 15 feet in a year and become <u>unmanageable</u>, if ignored. This tree is also <u>poisonous</u> to pets, and they are all over the Shumway Neighborhood!

The Tree of Heaven can be identified by its uniform mirrored leaflets and pungent odor of burnt peanut butter when leaves are crushed. It has smooth bark and a weak structure that is easy to break. Its lookalike, the Black Walnut, has jagged offset leaves. For further help with identifying the Tree of Heaven, download the PictureThis app on Android or Apple.  $^{^2}$ Herbicide/water ratio - As an example, a gallon of spray water with a 3 percent mixture is made by adding a sufficient volume of water to 4 ounces of liquid herbicide until a volume of 1 gallon is reached (4 oz \div 128 oz/gal = 0.03 or 3 percent). For dry formulations, particulates should be added to sufficient water as specified by the label until the required concentration or volume of spray water is reached.

COUNTY COUNCIL TO HOLD WORK SESSION AND PUBLIC HEARING ON 20-YEAR POPULATION PROJECTION

Vancouver, Wash. – As part of the county's efforts on the 2025 Comprehensive Growth Management Plan update, Clark County Council will hold a work session and conduct a public hearing to take public testimony and select a 2045 population projection from the range provided by the Washington Office of Financial Management (OFM).

The State of Washington authorizes OFM to prepare 20-year growth management population projections for all counties in Washington every five years. The projections are developed within the framework of expected state growth and include three distinct ranges – low, middle, and high for each county. Clark County's population for 2045 is forecasted as follows:

High 791,809
Middle 698,416
Low 576,151

According to state law (RCW 43.62.035), the **middle** range represents OFM's most likely estimate of a county's population. The RCW says in part: "the middle range shall represent the office's estimate of the most likely population projection for the county." Within each county, population planning targets for cities, towns, and unincorporated areas are worked out among the affected local jurisdictions as part of the regional, city and county planning process.

Both meetings will be held in a hybrid format. Attendees can join in person in the sixth-floor hearing room of the Public Service Center, 1300 Franklin St., or virtually via Webex.

The work session is scheduled for Wednesday, April 5 at 9 a.m. The work session is an informational session for the council to be briefed by staff in preparation for the hearing. The public is welcome to attend, however there will be no public comment at that time. That is reserved for the hearing.

The public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, April 18 at 6 p.m. The hearing will be live on CVTV channel 23/323 and available later that day for on-demand viewing on CVTV.org.
