Aging Readiness Plan Update

The Clark County Aging Readiness Plan assesses the county's readiness to serve as a home for a growing number of older residents. The plan includes strategies to improve the community's capacity to support its growing older population and ultimately benefit people of all ages. The plan covers the topics of housing, transportation/mobility, health care, support services, and civic activities.

How Kill the Tree of Hell

The "Tree of Heaven" is an invasive, toxic plant that grows very rapidly and can quickly take over property. It is difficult to get rid of and secretes a chemical into the soil that is <u>toxic</u> to surrounding plants. It can grow 15 feet in a year and become <u>unmanageable</u>, if ignored. This tree is also <u>poisonous</u> to pets, and they are all over the Shumway Neighborhood!

The Tree of Heaven can be identified by its uniform mirrored leaflets and pungent odor of burnt peanut butter when leaves are crushed. It has smooth bark and a weak structure that is easy to break. Its lookalike, the Black Walnut, has jagged offset leaves. For further help with identifying the Tree of Heaven, download the PictureThis app on Android or Apple. If you want to assist with "tagging" trees, download the EDDMapS app from the Android or Apple app stores. https://www.eddmaps.org/

It may take 2-3 years to eliminate the plant. To get rid of the tree, please follow the recommendations from Table 3 on the USDA.gov site: https://www.fs.usda.gov/Internet/FSE_DOCUMENTS/stelprdb5410131.pdf :



 $^{^2}$ Herbicide/water ratio - As an example, a gallon of spray water with a 3 percent mixture is made by adding a sufficient volume of water to 4 ounces of liquid herbicide until a volume of 1 gallon is reached (4 oz \div 128 oz/gal = 0.03 or 3 percent). For dry formulations, particulates should be added to sufficient water as specified by the label until the required concentration or volume of spray water is reached.

Clark County Comprehensive Plan Update

Clark County is conducting a periodic review of its Comprehensive Plan (Plan) as required by the Washington State Growth Management Act (GMA). The county is required to complete its update by June 30, 2025. The Plan, originally adopted in 1994 and last updated in 2016, is a long-range policy guide for how the county plans to manage growth and development over a twenty-year period. The GMA requires jurisdictions to periodically update their comprehensive plan and development regulations to bring them up to date with:

- Changes to state law,
- Land use changes,
- Population growth projections, and
- Housing projections.

The Comprehensive Plan guides County decisions related to land use; housing; capital facilities and utilities; rural and natural resources; transportation; economic development; parks, open space and recreation; schools; historic preservation; environment; community design; shoreline; and annexation.

The focal point of the County's long-range planning is the County's Comprehensive Plan and its Capital Facilities Plan which help with policy, financing and development regulation decisions over the 20-year period.
