Weeks after moving to the neighborhood with his wife Steph and golden retriever Benny, Lucius Shields stepped forward to volunteer as DuBois Park Neighborhood President. His first year saw a transition from the preventative measures that arose from the pandemic - Zoom neighborhood meetings, emails and socially distanced conversations with neighbors, officers from other neighborhoods and city leaders.

This year's 4th of July celebration was a step forward - bringing back what was and adapting for the present and future. A contentious neighborhood construction project that would prove to be disruptive and damaging to the feel of the neighborhood led Lucius to partner with key neighbors and Southcliff leaders to push for the city and state to reevaluate and ultimately propose a far less invasive (and equally as effective) stormwater drainage solution.

Nominations are open to anyone interested (email <u>duboispark@gmail.com</u> or speak with the current officers) to learn more about the President role or any of the other positions on the team.


Interest must be expressed by November 7th.

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You've Been Boo'd!

A Halloween boo is a little gift or treat left anonymously by a friend or neighbor. Once you've been boo'd, you hang a ghost picture on your front door, to let everyone know you've gotten your Halloween surprise. But there's more! Booing is a pay-it-forward game: Once you are boo'd, it's your turn to choose two neighbors and deliver treats to their house. Anonymously. Of course.

Boo Basics

Now it's your turn to boo two other people in the neighborhood. Here's what you do:

- I. Fill two bags with candy and treats. Make two copies of the letter and the ghost picture. Choose two neighbors who have not already been boo'd and make a boo bag for them. Include treats, the letter, and the ghost picture in their bag of goodies.
- 2. At a time when you're sure your neighbors aren't around, leave your treats near their front door. You can ring the doorbell if you like but be sure to run so they don't see you!
- 3. Hang the picture of the ghost on your front door so everyone can see that you have already been boo'd. And look for the ghost when you're deciding who to boo next one boo per house, please!

Keep your eyes peeled to see how many ghosts will appear in our neighborhood by Halloween!

Also its recommended delivering the treats within two days, to make sure everyone in the neighborhood has a chance to be boo'd.
