Purpose of checklist



- Provide adequate parking to serve existing uses and future development
- Create public and private spaces that are inclusive, integrated, and contribute positively to the livability of the corridors
- Provide ample opportunities for small-scale, locally owned businesses to thrive
- Contribute to a vibrant public realm that encourages interaction with an active edge along the ground floor, high-quality public spaces, and a walkable pedestrian environment.

The Overlay District creates regulations for building heights, parking requirements, building setbacks, bicycle parking, design standards for ground floor design, weather protection, minimum height, transparency of buildings, façade articulation, building materials, location of utilities, fencing, and landscaping.

While the overlay district is meant to encourage mixed use, commercial, and residential development, it is not anticipated any additional development will increase outputs to the surrounding environment by significant, adverse amounts.

- 2. How would the proposal be likely to affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life? The creation of Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors Overlay District would not likely affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life in the overlay area. While the overlay district is meant to encourage mixed use, commercial, and residential development, the area is already developed with these land uses. All requirements, regulations, and laws to preserve native vegetation and wildlife will be observed during any development.
 - Proposed measures to protect or conserve plants, animals, fish, or marine life are: No measures anticipated to be needed
- 3. How would the proposal be likely to deplete energy or natural resources? The creation of Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors Overlay District would not be likely to deplete energy or natural resources. While the overlay district is meant to encourage mixed use, commercial, and residential development, it is not anticipated any new development will significantly impact or deplete energy and natural resource use.
 - Proposed measures to protect or conserve energy and natural resources are: No measures anticipated to be needed

- 4. How would the proposal be likely to use or affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated (or eligible or under study) for governmental protection, such as parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands? Portions of Evergreen Boulevard are located within an environmentally sensitive area, specifically steep slope. These areas currently have improvements on the land, already disturbed from its natural state. Any development spurred from the implementation of the Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors Overlay District located within the steep slope area would follow all required additional development reviews under the critical areas ordinance or other required
 - Proposed measures to protect such resources or to avoid or reduce impacts are:
 Any development on environmentally sensitive lands will follow all required additional development reviews under the critical areas ordinance.
- 5. How would the proposal be likely to affect land and shoreline use, including whether it would allow or encourage land or shoreline uses incompatible with existing plans? There are currently no land or shoreline use in the Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors Overlay District that would be affected by any development resulting from the passage of the overlay district.
 - Proposed measures to avoid or reduce shoreline and land use impacts are: No measures anticipated to be needed
- 6. How would the proposal be likely to increase demands on transportation or public services and utilities? The proposed Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors Overlay District is meant to encourage compact, mixed-used development that may result in increased transit ridership. The exact amount and timing of development resulting from the passage of the Overlay District are unknown, it is not anticipated any resulting development would significantly or adversely impact City utilities or the transportation network.
