9th Annual "Leave the Leaves" event

The City of Vancouver will place leaf bins in front of Countryside Park from November 18-19th. The City places leaf bins in neighborhoods that have an abundance of deciduous trees to keep the leaves from clogging the stormwater system. The bins will likely be placed on Friday and picked up Monday morning. The bins are for leaves only; no plastic bags, garbage or other yard debris are allowed.

That weekend will also be the 9th Annual "Leave the Leaves' project in Countryside Park, where leaves around the park and from the bins are spread throughout the park. The leaves provide benefits for the soil and plants by adding nutrients, retaining soil moisture, loosening compaction and reducing weed growth. The leaves are a natural soil-builder as they decompose, and are making a difference in our park. They also provide winter cover to support pollinators (like butterflies and bees) and other invertebrates. This material is essential to the survival of many moths, snails, spiders, and dozens of arthropods. It also likely reduces our local impact on global climate change too!

In addition to recycling leaves into the park, there are wood chips that can be spread as mulch or added to the park's trails. Other tasks can be accomplished to help winterize the park; debris pick up, cleaning off graffiti, invasive weed pulling (eg. bittersweet nightshade, vinca, English ivy). Someone will be available at the park both Saturday and Sunday from about 10am – 12pm to answer any questions. Come dressed weather appropriate. If you have a wheelbarrow or lawn rake, bring them along. Thanks and hope to see you there!

📸 18th Street Widening Update



You may have noticed surveying along 18th Street. The city is moving along with plans for the widening of 18th street. About a year ago, First Place residents reached out to CWNA for assistance in having our voices heard. The goal being not to look like the previous widening of 18th from 205 to 138th Ave. We held a Zoom meeting with Ryan Lapossa (City Engineer) and Charles Ray (Urban forestry, City of Vancouver). While Ryan was very interested in hearing our concerns, he reminded us that the widening doesn't just affect the south side of 18th. We have worked hard reaching out to other neighborhoods.

I'm pleased to report that we have grown from a handful to several neighbors, representing Hearthwood, Evergreen Schools, Evergreen-Burton Neighborhood Association, Sunrise Glen HOA, Richland Estates, as well as Cimarron HOA & neighborhood association. The 18th Street Coalition's leadership covers a broad spectrum of talents from an engineer, arborist, attorney just to name a few.

We have many concerns from safety, increased road noise, and loss of privacy. We have also expressed our concerns regarding increased traffic speed, safety for walkers as well as bike riders. Ryan has embraced our enthusiasm and welcomes our input. Two members representing our neighborhoods will be invited to have a say in the hiring of the consulting firm. We have been promised a copy of the RFP (request for proposal). I've touched on just the beginning of our coalition, it continues to be a work in progress.
