account. \$3000 from savings was moved into a CD at 4.25% interest for 11 months. Delivered \$5050 check to the City for the Toddler playground equipment and spent \$201.85 on the sponsor insert and flyer. Income generated \$1399 for ads sponsors, \$100 for the COV Resource Conservation Challenge, \$311.61 for the Clean-up day.

Toddler Playground-PO into the supplier. Late Feb early march for install. Color scheme is nature-green and khaki tone that will match current pieces.

Transportation update: Leaf bins delivered on F street today. Picked up Monday morning. 2nd drop 1st weekend of Dec.

Question: Re-striping of Fourth Plain-why did the bike lane stop at F street? There were specific bicycle stop and go lights ordered and those are delayed. When it is in and when the rest of Fourth Plain is repaved next summer, it will be changed. Will be on Jan. meeting agenda about left turns.

EV charger on 20th and C street-should be going in soon. Material is procured, concrete is poured. It is not a rapid charger. It will cost 20 cents a Kilowatt/hr until enough people use it and then it goes down to 15 cents.

City Updates: From Mayor's update: Comprehensive Plan 2045. Over the next 1.5 years, community members and the City will work together to develop a plant that will guide growth and development in Vancouver through 2045. There is a new affordable housing fund of about 3.9 million. The best guess is that it will mean there will be 850 "affordable" units each year for Vancouver. Right now we are only able to produce about 255/yr now. Safe Stay #3 has been established downtown on 11th st. Safe Stay #4 at 4611 Main St is next. By 2024, we expect to have 5 Safe Stay Communities and a second Safe Stay park. Main Street Promise Project between 5th St and 15th Street is coming. Main street will be safer, more accessible and connected for residents, businesses and visitors.

Port Update: Julie Rawls-New mineral Soda Ash coming in. It is used in glass and solar panels. Trains will be coming in with it. Wind towers leaving the city today. Going to Alberta Canada. 450 people went to the Port Tours this summer. It's the only way for the public to see what goes on in the Port.

Neighborhood Coordinator: Kaitlyn Olszewski. She moved here in 2013 from Baltimore. She is very happy to be joining the City and working with us. Thurs, Nov 16th Westside Neighborhood Meeting at Luepke Center. The traffic team will be there.

Clark County Aging Readiness-Susan Ellinger, Franklin Johnson and Amy Wooten. Aging Readiness Update. By 2025 1 in 4 residents will be 60 or older. There have been major changes in the County since 2013-New transportation, increasing housing costs and increase in technology. To come up with the plan, public engagement through surveys, focus groups, and workshops were done. There are goals for Healthy Communities (e.g., improve access to healthy foods, safe and accessible parks, resources for caregivers, etc.) Housing Chapter goals (e.g., range of housing, housing that enables to age in place, etc.), Mobility goals (e.g., transit options, safe walking and rolling, etc.), Civic Involvement goals (e.g., support NA's and volunteer groups to engage older adults, cross-cultural and intergenerational community events, etc) and Emergency Preparedness goals (e.g., mitigate the impacts of hazards before they occur, prepare for natural hazards through education, etc). This report will serve as a tool for the county and towns within Clark County as they individually prepare to support the aging population.

Plan approved so now will start implementation.

Question who funds Aging Commission-They don't have a budget other than staff time. Working with other agencies who help fund those projects.

Emergency Preparedness-will be focusing on that in 2024 that will apply to older adults. Will be sending out info on that to Neighborhood Associations.

IBR-Nanette, **Casey**, **Bryan and Jay**. Moving towards draft Environmental Impact Statement report to be released early 2024. Map plan on what they are studying is on their website. You can zoom in on it. Tonight's presentation had an Urban Design Focus for the area of the Lower downtown- There is station area planning, local street connectivity, and main street connection to consider.

The Waterfront transit station will be up at bridge level (about 6 stories high)-elevator and stairs to get up to the station. East side will have a pedestrian/bike path. It has to be elevated because railroad is below. Need to consider what the area below will look like-could be more active with sport areas, could be more of a green space, could be a park, etc. and how will this area interact with the plans for the Waterfront development.

Question: Who will maintain this design once it is done? Need to figure out who the owner and operator is and make sure there is an abundance of money for maintenance.

Question: Sound-proofing for this area: Environmental Impact report will have a section on this.

The team will go out to neighborhoods to speak to the public on what they want to see on Urban Design.

As we close out 2023, its good to look back at this championship year for Arnada. Your Arnada Armada's SW Vancouver Neighborhood Kickball team took the summer 2023 title of Neighborhood Kickball Champions.
