Please do not arrive before 9am, we will not be ready to receive your items, and this will cause traffic to back up.

✓ Items Accepted:

- Bulky Items: Broken or worn-out items that are too large to fit in your garbage cart at home, such as a rug, kiddie pool, small appliances, furniture, broom, etc.
- Scrap Metal: Metal BBQs, bicycles, lawn furniture, mowers, car parts or small engines (drained of fluids) metal appliances (no freon containing items - no fridges/freezers, AC units)
- Yard Debris: Branches, grass, leaves, vines, bramble, arborvitae, juniper, bamboo, yard, and garden trimmings

✗ Items NOT Accepted:

- NO Tires
- NO Household trash or contractor waste
- NO concrete, cement, rocks, sod, or dirt
- NO Home project/remodel debris (i.e. flooring tiles, drywall, large amounts of fencing)
- NO Roofing shingles or roofing materials
- NO Hazardous chemicals, cleaners, paints or stains, fluids like gasoline or oil
- NO TVs, computers, or electronics (recycle for free, visit www.EcycleWashington.org for locations)
- NO CFL or fluorescent tube lights (recycle for free visit www.LightRecycle.org for locations)
- REALLY LARGE items like boats and hot tubs should be hauled directly to the transfer station at the owner's expense

Prepare Your Load:

- ☐ Categorize your load - separate material for easy unloading into the bulky item truck, yard debris box or truck, chipper, or metals box.
- ☐ Use a tarp liner under the yard debris for faster and cleaner unloading.
- ☐ Put the yard debris on the bottom, then the big stuff (furniture), then the other stuff tucked in around the big stuff.
- ☐ Don't forget to cover your load to prevent littering if you bring a truck or trailer. Come prepared to unload what you bring to the cleanup (i.e. leather gloves and tools to unload)
- ☐ To prevent injuries, please bring heavy materials, such as yard debris, in smaller containers or wheel barrels. Do not bring your curbside cart to the cleanup, as they are too heavy to dump.



18th Street Widening Update

As residents along N.E. 18th Street experience ever-increasing traffic, those who live closest to the road are being impacted more than others. As the road is widened this will only get worse as the probable loss of the Douglas Fir barrier will mean increased noise and pollution. If the East Powerline Trail (a regional bike and pedestrian trail that was approved by the city in 2006) is completed under the BPA towers, our neighbors on 16th will experience an increased loss of privacy and a decreased sense of security.

In anticipation of this, we are encouraging residents to take advantage of the agricultural leases that BPA granted to these residents when they purchased their homes on 16th Street. Some residents currently grow vegetables, flowers and other plantings in these leaseholds and that will not likely change. In addition to these plantings however, we have initiated what we call “The Hedgerow Project” to enable these residents to grow a dense protective barrier of native plants that might look like the picture included.



Such a group of native plants will provide a visual and sound dampening barrier and increase a sense of privacy and safety in residents' homes and backyards. It will also afford a similar sense of separation of the entire neighborhood from the road that will be an asset to all of us. Because we will be starting with plants in one-gallon pots, these bushes will take some time to grow. Each resident is taking responsibility for their watering and other care until they become self-sufficient. Many of the bushes will be flowering and fragrant like Mock Orange and Nootka Roses and most will be green year-round.

The cost of these plantings will largely be covered by a grant we have been awarded by the Watershed Alliance for \$5,000. That organization has befriended our neighborhood before when they granted First Place Neighborhood Association (FPNA) \$2,000 to renovate the Front Circle with drought tolerant plants several years ago.

The two neighborhoods to the east, Stonebriar and Countryside Woods have neighbors who have the same problem and the same BPA leases and those neighborhoods are also providing this opportunity to affected, interested residents. They will share in the grant funds. This project is voluntary, just as the trees that now border 9th Avenue were voluntary. In that case, again it was the result of a cooperating organization, Friends of Trees and further subsidized by FPNA. I think we can all agree, even if we are not directly affected, an attractive Front and Back door increases the livability and value of all of our homes.

Waste Free Lunches

Chip bags, pudding cups, plastic utensils, juice pouches, wrappers and more are filling up garbage cans in schools and workplaces all over Clark County, but what can we do about it? For starters, most of these items can be replaced with reusable or recyclable materials. How we pack our lunches can make a big impact on what we throw away; something as simple as replacing a juice pouch with a refillable drink container is a step in the right direction. Reusable, washable containers can be used for all sorts of things and will produce no extra plastic waste. It can even save you money! Buying a pack of disposable applesauce cups can cost you \$1.83 per serving, buying a jar and using your own container only costs \$0.36 per serving, packing your own every day can save you \$265 every school year. Going for more reusable and less disposable options for your snacks is the right option for the environment and your wallet. Below are some more tips on how you can take some small steps toward making your lunches waste free.
