
There is still plenty of time to update yourself on what is happening with the widening of 18th street. Look at the website and be sure and take the survey if you have not already done so. www.nestreet.info

Neighborhood Safety:

Keeping an eye out for unusual vehicles in our First Place Neighborhoods can have several **benefits** when it comes to safety and security. Here are some reasons why:

- 1. **Crime Prevention**: we can play a crucial role in preventing crime. By noticing unfamiliar or suspicious vehicles, you can help deter criminals. For example, if you see an **unusual car parked on your street for an extended period**, it's essential to take note of the **license plate number** and report it to the Vancouver police. This proactive approach can prevent crimes like thefts, burglaries, and vandalism.
- 2. **Early Detection**: Recognizing vehicles that don't belong to our neighborhoods or appears out of place can lead to early detection of criminal activity. Whether it's someone casing the area or other criminal activities, your vigilance can help us maintain the First Place Neighborhood as a great place to live.
- 3. **Community Bonding**: Keeping an eye out for unusual vehicles fosters a sense of community. By working together, we can create a safer neighborhood.
- 4. **Peace of Mind**: Knowing that our neighbors are vigilant and actively monitoring our neighborhood provides peace of mind. It's reassuring to have others looking out for your property and safety, especially if you're away from home.

Remember, reporting suspicious behavior or unfamiliar vehicles is essential for maintaining safety and security within our neighborhoods.

Case in point, this car just recently appeared one day on 152nd Avenue near the park. It has been there for two weeks now. On the surface, it appears to be either abandoned, disabled, or stolen. I don't think any of us wants our neighborhoods to be used as a dumping ground for these vehicles like we see in other areas.




This makes the second car to be stolen or abandoned by our First Place Park. The registration is long since expired, and it has front end damage as well as being parked on the wrong side of the street facing traffic in the blind corner. It has been reported to Vancouver Police.



Be Prepared!

- If using a truck or trailer to transport items to the cleanup, you must cover your load to prevent littering.
- · You will need to do the unloading yourself.
- · Also Available: Free curbside pickup of bulky items.

Note: If your residence has an account with Waste Connections, you can schedule ONE free pickup of up to 5 bulky items for anytime during 2024. Requirements apply. View details at cityofvancouver.us/bulkyitempidcup

What's Accepted at Neighborhood Cleanup?

- Bulky Items: Items too big for your garbage cart such as rug, kiddie pool, furniture, small appliances
- Scrap Metal: Metal grills, lawn chairs, mowers, etc. MUST be drained of gas, oil, etc. NO refrigerators, freezers, or AC units. {No freon.}
- Yard Debris: Branches, leaves, vines, bramble, etc.

What's NOT Accepted?

- NO Household trash or contractor waste
- NO Concrete, rocks, sod or dirt
- **NO** Home remodel debris, tiles, drywall, etc.
- **NO** Roofing shingles or roofing materials
- · NO Hazardous chemicals, cleaners, paint, stains, or fluids such as gasoline, oil or antifreeze
- NO TVs, computers or electronics. *see following
- NO CFL or fluorescent tube lights
- NO very LARGE items such as boats and hot tubs

What do committee volunteers and board members do?

<u>Picnic Committee</u> - organizes our Annual Picnic in First Place Park

<u>Holiday Luncheon Committee</u> - arranges a holiday celebration for the women in the neighborhood <u>Scholarship Committee</u> - gathers funds and chooses worthy recipient(s) from Evergreen High School

<u>First Place Neighborhood Ambassadors</u> - The Ambassadors welcome new neighbors, deliver welcome baskets, and periodically host Newcomer Gatherings

<u>FPNA Chairperson</u> - The Chairperson sets the meeting date and time for the board meetings and the quarterly general meetings. The Chairperson also helps develop the agenda with input from the elected board members and committee chairs. Other duties of the Chairperson include conducting the business meetings, coordinating with committee chairs or other neighborhood groups implementing projects, and resolving issues that may arise

<u>FPNA Vice Chairperson</u> - The Vice Chairperson acts as a support person, covering meetings when the Chairperson is unavailable and coordinates with the Treasurer to audit our funds yearly. Also the Vice Chairperson manages special projects as requested by the Chair

<u>Safety Chairperson</u> - The Safety Chairperson checks and notifies the City when street lights are out and has managed the curb address painting. Further the Safety Chair has been on the lookout for hazard issues in First Place, such as low tree limbs obscuring stop and street signs

FPNA Communication Coordinator - The FPNA Communicate Coordinator maintains the master list of residents and sends out announcements of neighborhood activities

<u>Ladies' Luncheon Coordinator</u> - Coordinator sets the time and location for their meetings

Men's Luncheon Coordinator - Coordinator sets the time and location for their meetings

FPNA Newsletter Editor – Reviews newsletter submissions, builds and edits the quarterly newsletter and sends it to the FPNA Chairperson for review and approval.
