

Neighborly Reminders 🏩

- The City of Vancouver has Homeless
 Assistance and Response Team (HART) should
 you see someone camping in the park and in
 need of help. Use the MyVancouver.App to
 get help via your phone or Email:

They will send someone out to assist the individual(s).

- Please be very considerate of the animals and birds in the neighborhood when using either pesticides or herbicides as these can poison cats and dogs as well as birds.
- The final pavement sealing process will be finished in 2025, so be prepared for notifications when that process will begin at the end of the current school year.
- If you have not made out the Membership Application, which gives every resident, home owner, long term renter, or business – voice and vote in the Airport Green Neighborhood Association. Please make one out per household and send it to Tina Litsey. Yes, dues are a voluntary \$12 per year. This helps in funding our various activities for the neighborhood at large.

- Curb Painting Program will begin in June for those residents who want their house numbers painted on the curb. This assists first responders in locating your house quickly during an emergency. Whether in the dark or during inclement weather, finding the correct house number can be challenging. This removes that challenge when every second counts.
- Two free apps for you phone that are highly beneficial: **RecycleRight** and **MyVancouver**.
 - RecycleRight from Waste Connections provides a calendar of your pickup day and which cans are to be put out, bulk pickup, and answers to questions on trash and recycling.
 - The MyVancouver provides requests, resources of unhoused, events calendar and feedback on City projects, plans and initiatives, even crime reporting, and more.
- Please keep curbs and storm water drains cleared of debris, leaves, needles, and cones.

Responses to Neighborhood Concerns



Sidewalks in neighborhood with raised sections are tripping hazards. Property owners need to maintain for walkability.

The Executive Board will be mapping the areas where sidewalks have buckled and may need repair. We will also look into how best to help those homeowners affected.

Burned out house on Airport Drive

The Executive Board felt that the current owners are dealing with legal as well as bureaucratic obstacles. The owners want to teardown the house and rebuild

Get cars off the street and parked in driveways. The occasional RVs occupied by homeless at SE 1st and Hearthwood block and abandoned vehicles left in the area.

The occasional RVs and abandoned vehicles have been removed. As for cars parked by fire hydrants and stop signs need to be moved or reported to the City of Vancouver for police action. The owners of the RV on Airport Drive have been notified to move their trailer, but have refused to do so. Any RV or travel trailer parked on the street is a hazard to emergency responders and needs to be parked on the owner's property or a storage facility.

Amazon/UPS/FedEx delivery vehicles speeding through neighborhood.

Drivers have been spoken to and seem to be complying so far.

Low visibility at night due to faulty street lights on Airport Drive.

People need to stop blowing their yard debris in the street. Clean the debris up and put it in the yard waste bin where it belongs.

Those using a professional service for yard work, need to remind those workers to not blow debris into the street, but pick up and place in a yard debris bin.

Job description for committees; I would like to see the Board meet more than twice a year. Have a neighborhood community calendar to help with activity planning.

The description for committees and neighborhood calendar were in the January/February Newsletter this year. A brief calendar reminder will be included in each Newsletter. The Executive Board meets about four times a year, and has already had two meetings.

Discuss electronic voting and/or Hybrid meetings?

The Executive Board did talk about this at our last meeting and would require an amendment to our Bylaws going forward.

People rummaging through recycling bins.

A recent email to AGNA residents was sent out regarding this issue and advised not to engage with the individual(s). Take photos, videos, get license plate, make and model of vehicle(s) and complete description of the individuals going through the bins. This is a violation of City Code.

Cats running loose, digging up flower beds.

Please do not allow you cats or dogs to roam freely as this impacts the neighborhood and community.

Reduction in street lanes outside of our neighborhood (but areas I have to drive). In favor of dedicated bike lanes. This has already had a detrimental impact on my commute times.

Shrubs blocking right turn onto Mill Plain.

Dutch Bros Exit, view blocked by bus and two inside lanes of traffic try to get in front of bus while traffic is exiting Dutch Bros and 7/11.

All three are beyond our neighborhood and are out of the responsibility the Executive Board has authority to address. However, you can still submit your feelings and feedback to the City of Vancouver through the MyVancouver App or www.cityofvancouver.us/services/report-concern/



Neighborhood Alliance

Each of the board members selects a couple of areas of responsibility. As part of my assignment, I represent Airport Green in the Vancouver Neighborhood Alliance. In that position, I receive invitations to represent neighborhood concerns to the mayor and other city officials. I have accepted a one-year commitment to be the VNA Vice Chair.

The VNA provides liability insurance to Neighborhood associations for \$100 per year. (AGNA has long purchased its own liability policy.) Through the VNA, we have the opportunity to work with other Neighborhood associations cooperatively. Most neighborhoods struggle with the same issues we do, speeding in residential areas, street surfaces, law enforcement, etc.

Recently, I was invited to spend an hour with our mayor, discussing area concerns. The city streets manager was present, and I mentioned to him that AGNA is due for cape sealing this year.

Since re-surfacing projects begin in July, I noted that we have an AGNA Parade on July 4 – and it would be good if that did not conflict with the cape seal project. He made a note of that. Further, we discussed the visibility of the speed limit sign at Hearthwood School. Other neighbors were in attendance, and we had a profitable discussion about a number of issues.

We learned that the "My Vancouver" app is going away in November, since it is operated by an outside organization – and the city is reducing costs. It will be replaced – but it is unknown at this time what that will look like. In the meantime, continue to use the My Vancouver app – or use the city website to report issues such as parking, campers on the street, etc.

Neighborhood Cleanup



This is the third year that Airport Green Neighborhood has been partnered with other neighborhood associations. This year we share this with Emerald Green NA and Fircrest NA held at the Evergreen Public School Administration Building parking lot. Neighbors may access the clean-up site from 8:00 until 2:00 pm for metal, yard debris, and bulky items.



The acceptable items are:

- Scrap metal (be prepared to help unload your scrap metal items),
- Bicycles for reuse,
- Small appliances (such as vacuums or lamps),
- Lawn mowers, small engines and garden equipment drained of fluids,
- Yard debris such as clippings, small logs and tree branches. Note: You can bring yard debris in bags but they will be dumped out of the bags.

Prepare by categorizing your load to separate material for easy unloading.

- Using a tarp liner under the yard debris makes for faster and cleaner unloading.
- Putting yard debris on the bottom, then the biggest items on top, followed by any other items tucked in and around the biggest
- Don't forget to cover your load to prevent littering if bringing a truck or trailer.

We need your help! Volunteers are greatly needed to sign up with Pam or Sue to fill the roughly three-hour shift times available are 8:00 to 11:00 am and 11:00 to 2:00 pm.

Items Not Accepted

- Household trash or contractor waste
- · Concrete, cement, rocks, sod or dirt
- Home project/remodel debris (i.e. flooring tiles, drywall, large amounts of fencing, roofing, etc.)
- Hazardous chemicals, cleaners, paints or stains, fluids like gasoline or oil
- Hazardous products (paint, aerosol cans, automotive fluids, oil filters, cleaners, polishes, fluorescent light bulbs, fuelpropane tanks, household batteries, lawn or garden chemicals, mercury thermometers, sharps, or any container with the words poison, corrosive, combustible, caustic, volatile, flammable, danger, caution, or warning written on it).
- Electronics TVs, computers, and printers. (recycle for free, visit www.EcycleWashington.org)
- CFL or fluorescent tube lights (recycle for free visit www.LightRecycle.org)
- · Refrigerators, freezers, and air conditioners or HVAC equipment
- Home and Yard/Garden pesticides, cleaners, poisons, unused paint or stains
- Propane Tanks, or Un-drained auto parts or small engines
- Tires use your Spring Coupon to dispose of up to four passenger tires for
- Liquids of any kind
- Really large items like boats and hot tubs. These should be hauled directly to the transfer station at the owner's expense.

The picnic will start shortly after everyone from the parade has arrived.


