2: Starting process to update ESNA Bylaws. Due to COVID era challenges, and near-dormant periods, the Bylaws for the neighborhood are out of date, and need updated. Putting together a Bylaw review committee will be helpful in assessing the Bylaws. Nominations for the committee will be accepted at the May meeting. This will also lay ground work for updating the Neighborhood Action Plan.
