PORT OF VANCOUVER USA PLANS TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF MAIN ADMINISTRATION BUILDING ALTERNATE LOCATION FOR PORT COMMISSION MEETINGS

Planned renovations begin May 30; starting in June, commission meetings temporarily held at CTRAN's Board Room

The Port of Vancouver USA today provided public notice that it will temporarily close its north administration building, including its public commission meeting room. The closure will begin May 30 and will allow for planned renovations to its aging building. Work is scheduled to last through the end of 2025.

Throughout the building renovation, the port will maintain its full slate of operations and the commission will hold publicly accessible meetings on its normal schedule.

Commission meetings: same schedule, temporary location

Starting with its June 10 meeting, the port commission will temporarily relocate its public meetings to CTRAN's Board Room (10600 NE 51st Circle, Vancouver 98682).

Commission meetings will take place on their normal dates and times: the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 9:30 a.m. Any changes to the meeting schedule will follow normal protocol and the port will provide public notification in advance.

Meetings will continue to be broadcast and streamed live via CVTV and will offer opportunities for the public to comment in-person or virtually.

The commission meeting room will be closed for the duration of the renovation work.

Public resource availability

Starting May 30, port administrative staff, commission comment forms, tide books and other public resources will be temporarily located at 2801 NW Lower River Road, within the Plastics Northwest building, from 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The north administration building parking lot and EV charging stations immediately adjacent to Lower River Road will remain closed to the public throughout the renovation.

City Manager Update: June 2025

Vancouver is in the midst of a continuing transformation into an economic driver of the bi-state greater Portland region and is experiencing sustained population and job growth. And while the economic activity is positive, the recent population boom has also increased the cost of living. This places more pressure on historically underserved communities and can worsen economic disparity.



Knowing that we need to make proactive investments in economic security and opportunity for all current and future residents, the City Council adopted the City's first-ever <u>Five-Year Economic Development Strategy</u> in April. This inclusive strategy is set up to help accelerate economic growth and address growing disparities within the community. It is organized around four primary goals:

- Establish pathways to accessible, quality jobs
- Create opportunities for intergenerational wealth
- Position Vancouver as an inclusive center of innovation and entrepreneurship
- Invest in neighborhood commercial districts
- Vancouver must be strategic in its approach to economic development so we can maintain competitiveness in the face of recent economic instability and current challenges.

Our strategy was developed using both data analysis and broad community engagement. The strategy will also be aligned with and complements the region's economic development roadmap led by the <u>Columbia River Economic Development Council</u> and <u>Workforce Southwest</u> <u>Washington's</u> 2025-2029 Strategic Plan. This ensures that Vancouver's actions fit with existing initiatives and that they leverage available tools and resources for maximum impact.

We welcome this new chapter in Vancouver's economic development. This strategy will guide our efforts over the next five years as we work towards creating a more prosperous, innovative and inclusive city.

- A commute under 60 minutes (incl. walking and waiting times). For programs 4-weeks or shorter, hosts can also help drive part or all of the way to school.

ACES provides ongoing support to you and your student. We also offer a small stipend to help cover some of the costs of hosting. Stipends vary by program—feel free to ask!
