TRANSPORTATION & ROAD UPDATES

Ryan Lopossa, Transportation Manager with the City of Vancouver, provided the following updates on key roadway projects affecting our neighborhood at our last general meeting:



SE 34th Street Improvements Work on SE 34th Street is **currently on pause due** to material delivery delays. Once construction is complete, the project will enter a **one-year evaluation period**. During this time, the City will collect traffic data, observe changes in traffic patterns, and assess usage by bicyclists, pedestrians, and C-TRAN riders. Staff will also monitor traffic flow at the 164th signal and has taken our feedback on issues neighbors have encountered getting through that light efficiently.



176th Avenue & SE 29th Street Roundabout Designs are underway for a future roundabout at the intersection of 176th and SE 29th. The project requires the sale of small portions of land from two neighboring HOAs. While the South HOA has approved the sale, the North HOA (The Firs) did not receive enough signatures for approval - if you live there please vote! The City is continuing to work through next steps, as the roundabout will be one of the first major projects in the Vancouver Innovation Center (VIC) build-out.

PARK IMPROVEMENT UPDATES

This fall, volunteers will lead a native planting project at the **SE entrance of Clearmeadows**, aiming to **support pollinators and contribute** to the City's Climate Action Plan through neighborhood partnership. Sign up to volunteer!

At Heritage Park, the City has already removed several trees due to disease and is currently evaluating the potential removal of four additional cedar trees affected by a canker disease. A replanting plan will follow, and the City is assessing both the types of trees to plant and the best locations for them.

Also at Heritage Park, the **playground and rubber surfacing**, installed in 2017, are also being monitored. Although the tiles are showing signs of wear, they still provide adequate fall protection. The rubber tiles have an expected lifespan of 10–15 years, now in their eighth year, there are no immediate plans for replacement, but the City is tracking their condition along with similar surfacing in other parks.



It takes a team to keep our parks looking great! **Thank you to City Staff**—including Urban Forestry, Parks Maintenance, and Grounds crews—for all their hard work. And of course, thanks to the neighbors who pick up after pets and use trash bins and HOAs who play a key role by maintaining smaller parks and landscaped areas.

ZIPLY FIBER UPDATE

Ziply began work to expand high-speed fiber-optic internet in our neighborhood. While the mainline installation along SE 34th Street hasn't started yet, Ziply is working with the City of Vancouver to finalize the route. Service is expected by September 1, pending any delays. If issues arise during construction (e.g., sprinklers, gas lines, or property damage), please contact the appropriate party—Ziply or its contractors for landscaping/property issues, NW Natural for gas concerns, and the City of Vancouver for general project or permitting questions.



CONVENIENT COMPOSTING FOR EVERY HOUSEHOLD

Did you know that food waste in landfills produces LOTS of methane-a greenhouse gas up to 84x more potent than carbon dioxide over 20 years? Thankfully, there are easy composting options for everyone in Vancouver!

If you live in a single-family home:

You already have access to curbside Organics service through Waste Connections of WA. Toss all your food scraps-yes, all food!-into your green cart and help reduce harmful emissions.

If you live in an apartment, condo, or townhome:

Try the We Compost program! With free Community Hub drop-off locations across Clark County, composting has never been easier. Bonus: request a free kitchen scrap pail to collect food waste at home. We Compost carts accept food only (no yard waste).

STAY SAFE & COOL!

Summer is in full swing, and while we love the sunshine and longer days, it's important to stay safe and prepared—especially during heatwaves. Here are a few helpful tips to keep you and your family cool, comfortable, and protected this season:



Stay Hydrated: Drink plenty of water throughout the day-don't wait until you're thirsty!

Avoid Peak Sun Hours: Try to limit outdoor activity between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., when the sun is strongest.

Check on Neighbors: Take a moment to check in on elderly neighbors or those without air conditioning during extreme heat.

Don't Forget Pets!

Keep fresh water available at all times, especially for pets that are outdoors during hot days.



Protect Your Skin

Wear Sunscreen: Use broadspectrum SPF 30+ and reapply every 2 hours, especially if swimming or sweating.

Dress Smart: Light-colored, loosefitting clothes and wide-brimmed hats can make a big difference!

Shade Up: Seek out shade whenever possible-umbrellas, trees, and even a cool porch can help you stay safe.



Stay Cool at Home

Close Curtains and Blinds during the hottest part of the day to keep indoor spaces cooler.

Use Fans and AC efficiently point box fans out the window to push hot air out, and make sure ceiling fans rotate counter-clockwise in summer.

Cool Zones: If you don't have air conditioning, visit public spaces like libraries, shopping centers, or cooling centers during heatwaves.



Pavement can become hot enough to burn a dog's paws. Test if a pavement is too hot for your dog by placing the back of your hand on the pavement for 7 seconds. If it's too painful for you, then it's too painful for your dog's paws. Instead, walk dogs in the early morning or evening.
